

## Letter from CEO

Every year, we take stock of the impact we have on those with addiction, mental health maladies, victims of abuse, and those in need of a family to call their own. We quantify words like permanency, safety, recovery, independence, and protection. And we honor acts of prevention, intervention, and recovery.

This year, I've asked our team to highlight some of your accomplishments across northwest Florida and the impact they have had on our state and beyond.

- 75% of participants successfully completed substance use treatment services, well above our DCF target of 51% and the state average of 58%.
- 97% of children in out-of-home care received dental services, exceeding the state average of 88%.
- 43% of youth in out-of-home care reached permanency in 12 months – surpassing the state average of 32%!

I am humbled to say our network of professionals across the Northwest region *Leads the Way* once again. Our purpose remains transcendent, our culture remains grounded in truth, and our results remain best in class.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, thank you for an incredible year of changing tens of thousands of lives. You made all the difference.

# Financial Update

## Statement of Financial Position

In the 2024-2025 Fiscal Year, NWFHN is proud to report that it continued to see growth in its annual budget, allowing the agency to continue its mission-driven programs and services. NWFHN ended the fiscal year with unaudited total assets of \$63 million.


## Revenue and Support

NWFHN's unaudited total revenue for 2024-2025 was \$280.3 million, derived from grants, individual donations, fundraising, rental revenue, and other sources. This is an approximately 2.9% increase over the 2023-2024 total revenue. NWFHN held the 2nd annual Rock the Kids fundraising event in 2024. NWFHN proudly reports that the combined events raised approximately \$30,000 in net income. NWFHN continues to be deeply grateful for the generous support of grantors, donors, and others, which have enabled us to expand much-needed programs and services in the 18 counties we serve.

## Expenses

NWFHN management continues to be committed to ensuring funds are directed toward mission-driven programs and services. In 2024-2025, NWFHN continued to dedicate more than 98% of expenditures to program services, demonstrating continued focus on maximizing the impact of funding dollars. NWFHN's management continues to take pride in minimizing indirect administrative costs; this is demonstrated by an unaudited indirect administrative rate of less than 2% in 2024-2025. This low indirect administrative rate is consistent with that noted in many previous years.

## Financial Health and Sustainability

Due to continued unprecedented increases in out-of-home care, driven by the acuity of care costs and availability of foster homes, rather than the number of children in care, NWFHN continues to be focused on monitoring both the DCF Child Protection Community Based Care Lead Agency East and West budgets in 2024-2025. This same focus will be required in 2025-2026 since these contracts have not had a funding increase. NWFHN continues to work with its funding partners to minimize any potential deficits.



## Fiscal Accountability

NWFHN continues to provide fiscal accountability by presenting bi-monthly financial statements to its Board of Directors. Fiscal operating plans are reviewed by the finance committee and then forwarded to the full board for approval. An annual audit committee of the Board of Directors reviews the results of the Independent Auditors' Audit Report. Thomas Howell Ferguson P.A. CPAs served as the independent auditor for NWFHN in 2023-2024 and issued an unmodified opinion on the most recent audited financial statements. The auditor's report confirms that our financial statements present a true and fair view of our financial position and comply with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). NWFHN's 2024-2025 financial statements will be audited by Thomas Howell Ferguson P.A. CPAs.

## Looking Forward

As NWFHN looks forward to the 2025-26 Fiscal Year, management expects moderate revenue and expenditure growth and currently has an adopted budget of approximately \$280 million.

## Reunifications

We are thrilled to announce that 385 children were safely **reunified** with their families this year. NWF Health Network leads the state in permanency within 12 months. Our success proves what's possible when we surround families with the right help and support.

# National Adoption Month 2024

Each November, NWF Health Network participates in National Adoption Month. November 2024 was a time of joy, hope, and celebration across our service area as we joined with partners, families, and community members to honor the gift of adoption.

**Circuit 1** hosted a moving event at Pensacola's Gallery Night. Children available for adoption had their artwork on display, illuminating their stories and including QR codes inviting attendees to learn more about adoption. Each piece became more than art – it became a beacon of awareness and possibility, drawing our community closer to the mission of ensuring every child has a forever family.

During National Adoption Month, 35 children in our service area officially joined their forever families.

**In Circuit 2**, nine children were welcomed into forever families during a celebration filled with tears of joy and heartfelt appreciation. Each adoption marked not just a legal milestone but the beginning of a new chapter of belonging, stability, and unconditional love.

**In Circuit 14**, the theme "Building Our Family" set the tone for the month. Six families grew through adoption, each moment a powerful reminder of resilience and renewal. Judge Stevenson captured the essence of the day with his powerful words:

**"The difference between a building block and a stumbling block is often just perspective."**



## Adoptions: Christmas Adoptions

NWF Health Network is proud to be the **only** organization in the nation to conduct annual Christmas adoptions. These events across our region ensure that the families have an even more special holiday each year. December 2024 was the seventh year that NWF Health conducted its annual Christmas adoption ceremony, during which more than 30 children were adopted throughout the years. This year, 11 children were adopted in Christmas adoption ceremonies.

# Independent Living: Program Overview

NWF Health Network's Independent Living Program provides critical support for youth as they transition from foster care into adulthood. The program is designed for young people ages 18–23 who are in or have aged out of Florida's foster care system, with the goal of equipping them with the skills and stability needed to live successfully on their own.

**The program focuses on four key areas:**

- 1. Life Skills Development** – Training in practical areas such as budgeting, cooking, job readiness, and time management. These skills prepare them for the responsibilities of adulthood and help build long-term independence.
- 2. Education and Career Support** – Participants are encouraged to complete high school, pursue higher education, and explore vocational training. The program also assists with job placement, resume building, and interview preparation.
- 3. Housing and Stability** – Safe, stable housing is a cornerstone of the program. NWF provides access to transitional living homes and housing assistance so participants have a secure environment while working toward their goals.
- 4. Mentorship and Guidance** – Independent Living Specialists work one-on-one with participants, offering guidance, encouragement, and accountability.

The program also links youth to healthcare, transportation, and community resources, ensuring a full network of support during this critical period of transition. For those with unique interests, Independent Living provides specialized opportunities to explore and grow talents.

The Independent Living Program meets youth where they are and helps chart a path forward. Outcomes range from educational milestones and employment to stable housing and personal growth. The goal is to ensure every young person leaving foster care has the confidence, resources, and support to thrive as an independent adult.



By investing in these young people, **NWF Health Network** changes individual lives and **strengthens the communities** they call home.

# Independent Living: Success Story Tate Grove

NWF Health Network proudly highlights Tate Grove, a participant in its Independent Living Program whose story reflects resilience and growth. This year, Tate was one of only 20 young people statewide to graduate from the Florida Youth Leadership Academy (FYLA) Class of 2025, a leadership development program for youth in Florida's child protection system.

Throughout the year, Tate was mentored by Tyrone Cleveland, NWFHN's Independent Living Housing Specialist, who worked closely with him on leadership and life skills. That support helped Tate step forward as a leader, from campaigning for Vice President of his FYLA cohort to collaborating with peers on projects across the state.

Highlights included touring Florida State University and FAMU, completing a high ropes course, and recording the official FYLA 2025 music video in Miami. Tate also attended the Florida Children & Families Summit and his first black-tie gala — an experience made possible with Tyrone's guidance.

Today, Tate's growth continues at Music for Life, a transitional living home in Tallahassee that nurtures musical talent. There, he is developing skills in music production, performance, and business — laying the foundation for a promising future in the industry.



# Responsible Fatherhood Initiative: Overview

NWF Health Network's Responsible Fatherhood Initiative made remarkable strides in the 2024-2025 fiscal year, far surpassing its service goals and strengthening families across its 18-county region. More than 280 fathers engaged in services this year, *nearly triple the original target*.

This 12-week core curriculum, extended FIT Plan, and expanded telehealth services have opened new pathways for engagement, particularly for incarcerated fathers preparing to reenter their communities. Enhanced data systems and monthly reporting now provide case managers and stakeholders with a clearer picture of progress, reinforcing the program's alignment with child protection and behavioral health services.

Additionally, NWFHN hosted the Fatherhood Conference at Florida State University, expanded partnerships with schools, military bases, and justice system leaders, and shared resources at dozens of civic, health, and faith-based events.

Through this work, NWFHN continues to demonstrate the power of integrated care — showing how supporting fathers creates stronger families and more resilient communities.



**95%** of fathers reported greater parenting confidence, and more than half **increased meaningful involvement** in their children's lives.

# Responsible Fatherhood Initiative: Impact Story

Mr. Smith had custody of his children on and off before violating his probation and being reincarcerated. He joined the Responsible Fatherhood Initiative while in jail and worked through many of his challenges with the support of his Fatherhood Peer Specialist. He has since been released, celebrated a year of sobriety, and was reunified with his children.

They now all live together in a new home and regularly attend church as a family. Mr. Smith has secured a quality job that supports him through his probation requirements, family needs, and community service obligations.

He reports increased confidence in his parenting skills and has had no probation violations since his release.



## Law Enforcement Outreach Coordinators

NWF Health Network continues to provide support at the intersection of the criminal justice system and behavioral health needs through the Sheriff's Outreach Coordinator program. NWFHN partners with the Sheriffs in Bay, Calhoun, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson, Jefferson, Liberty, Taylor, Wakulla, Walton, and Washington Counties to fund Outreach Coordinator positions within those agencies. Sheriffs' Outreach Coordinators provide education to the community on local resources, link community members to services to meet their behavioral health needs, and assist incarcerated persons with re-entry planning. The Outreach Coordinator program enables the Sheriffs' Offices to serve as a conduit of change and provides a mechanism for alternatives to the criminalization of behavioral health issues.

Outreach Coordinators in each county come from vastly different experiences and backgrounds, bringing unique perspectives to the Sheriffs' Offices as well as to one another. Outreach Coordinators support one another across the NWF Health Network, providing resources, recommendations, and education to each other. Many of the Outreach Coordinators have become Certified Peer Support Specialists through the Florida Certification Board. NWFHN is continuing efforts to increase the use of peer supports for reentry and fatherhood initiatives in our law enforcement partnerships.



During the 24/25 FY, **5,000 individuals were assisted** through the Outreach Coordinator Program, and over **1,000 individuals were reached** through Outreach events. Outreach Coordinators provided **6,596 Outreach services** to their communities.

## Law Enforcement Certified Peer Support Specialists

NWF Health Network and the Florida Certification Board (FCB) collaborated to launch the first-ever *Certified Law Enforcement Peer Support Specialist (CRPS)* designation. This 50-hour program covers trauma awareness, peer listening skills, and response strategies. The program empowers officers to support one another through shared experiences and formalizes peer support with tools and training, making it more effective and sustainable.

41 law enforcement officers and staff from 13 Sheriff's Offices within the NWFHN region have completed the training and certification. In addition, multiple state agencies are participating in the program. NWFHN and FCB are working to expand the certification into a nationwide standard.

## NWF Health Connects Resource Expos

Over the past year, NWF Health Connects Resource Expos were held in multiple counties throughout northwest Florida, reaching over 500 attendees and featuring more than 100 community partner agencies. These events were designed with a clear purpose: to connect those who serve our communities—including school staff, law enforcement, behavioral health providers, case managers, child protective investigators, home visitors, and community leaders—with the resources they can share with the families and individuals they serve. In many ways, the Expos serve as *NWFHealthConnects.org* brought to life, offering an in-person opportunity for professionals to see, meet, and build trust with the organizations they may refer their clients to. By bringing together professionals from multiple systems, the Expos create an environment where knowledge can be exchanged, questions can be answered, and collaboration can flourish.

Each Expo showcased a comprehensive range of local and regional resources, including mental health services, substance use treatment, housing support, domestic violence programs, care coordination, career assistance, legal services, parenting programs, food and clothing pantries, and more. Attendees had the opportunity to speak directly with providers, learn about the latest services and programs available in their communities, and gather materials that could support their work in real time.

Beyond information-sharing, the Expos emphasized provider-to-provider connections, enabling professionals to build networks that strengthen referral pathways and improve coordination of care. By equipping front-line professionals with up-to-date information, fostering collaboration, and creating stronger referral systems, the Expos ultimately help improve access to essential services for the people and families who need them most, reinforcing a more connected and responsive system of care across Northwest Florida.



## Community Engagement

Throughout the year, NWF Health Network continued to strengthen the safety net of care for children, families, and communities across our region. By investing in relationships and deepening collaboration with partners across the panhandle, we worked to build a more connected, effective, and compassionate system of care for those we serve.

Through hundreds of outreach events, trainings, and joint initiatives, NWF Health Network reached thousands of individuals with behavioral health, child protection, and prevention resources. Our Community Relations team remained active in health fairs, neighborhoods, churches, schools, and civic spaces, hosting resource tables, leading presentations, and ensuring families know where to find care, how to access services, and how to support others in need. From large-scale provider expos to military-focused outreach, our team made it a priority to meet people where they are.

We also hosted several events, including Bonded by Blue, a day of connection for law enforcement and child protection professionals during Child Abuse Prevention Month. Our annual *GENTRACON* (Generational Trauma Conference) brought together leaders, providers, and community members to strengthen trauma-informed practices across systems of care.

The Faith Initiative continued to grow, engaging more than 280 faith-based partners and providing grant funding to churches and faith-based organizations dedicated to mental health outreach and substance use prevention. This year's Faith Summit celebrated the powerful impact these partnerships have made across our communities, showcasing how faith leaders are fostering connection, reducing stigma, and extending hope to families in need. These collaborations highlight the vital role faith communities play in strengthening families and building a foundation of care rooted in compassion and understanding.

Every partnership, every program, and every event this year reflects the same truth: real change begins with relationships. Each connection built strengthens the network of care that makes Northwest Florida a place where hope grows and lives are transformed.
